Communication Studies allows you to combine theory and production with an emphasis on Social Justice. Drawing on the social sciences, theoretical coursework in Communication Studies allows you to understand the role that the media play in our lives and how they can contribute to social change by shifting away from the consumerist mentality that media currently foster.

By critiquing the way media operate and how they contribute to solving social problems, you can help develop new ways of looking at the world and contribute to positive social change.

Practice what you preach

Dr. James Winter presents his class “Communication, Globalization and Social Justice” as a challenge to his students rather than a standard lecture. The most recent challenge was to raise awareness about the injustices faced by Haitians. Students produced a documentary, “The New Face of Democracy” and successfully proposed a “No Sweat” policy to the University of Windsor Student Alliance for the University campus: the university should only deal with companies that operate ethically, treat and pay workers fairly. Political Science

The Political Science program offers students an exceptional range of courses on Canadian politics, public policy, comparative politics, political thought and international relations. You can learn about the politics and government of Canada, the United States, Europe, the Middle East, Africa and Asia. You will also explore the history of political thought, the role of women in politics, research methods, and Diaspora studies and environmental policy.

The Political Science department emphasizes student-centred teaching that fosters the development of each student's creative and academic skills. You will develop the research, writing and public speaking skills demanded by employers and law school. In addition, you will be offered the possibility of participating in an internship program in your fourth year that allows students to secure work experience.

International Relations and Developmental Studies

The program in International Relations and Development Studies links courses in several areas of study to provide a broad understanding of the dynamics of global society. All students in the program take a common core of courses primarily in Political Science. Students then choose two fields of concentration from History, Sociology and Anthropology, Economics, Diaspora, Gender Studies and Languages.

The Honours BA in International Relations and Development Studies is a demanding yet rewarding degree that provides students with a multi-faceted understanding of global politics. It is also a degree that can easily be combined with study abroad. Our graduates have an excellent record of securing rewarding employment or going on to post-graduate degrees or law school.

Diaspora Studies focuses on issues of identity critical to the multi-ethnic and multi-cultural nature of western countries. Diasporas exist for groups of people that share a collective memory of forced dispersion and emigration from an ancestral homeland, resettlement in many countries, and a deep longing to maintain connection to their homeland and culture. Most immigrant communities include diasporic identities – the Jewish, Armenian, Ukrainian, African, and Irish diasporas are very well known.

Diaspora Studies is available as a minor or major within a Combined Honours B.A. (to be taken with another subject), such as the Social Work and Diaspora Studies program. The Combined (Double Major) in Diaspora Studies will require courses from seven different departments including Political Science, Sociology, English, Communication Studies, and History.

Whether you choose to pursue a degree in Political Science, International Relations and Development Studies, or Diaspora Studies at UWindsor, you will be learning at the edge of one of the world's most important international borders. 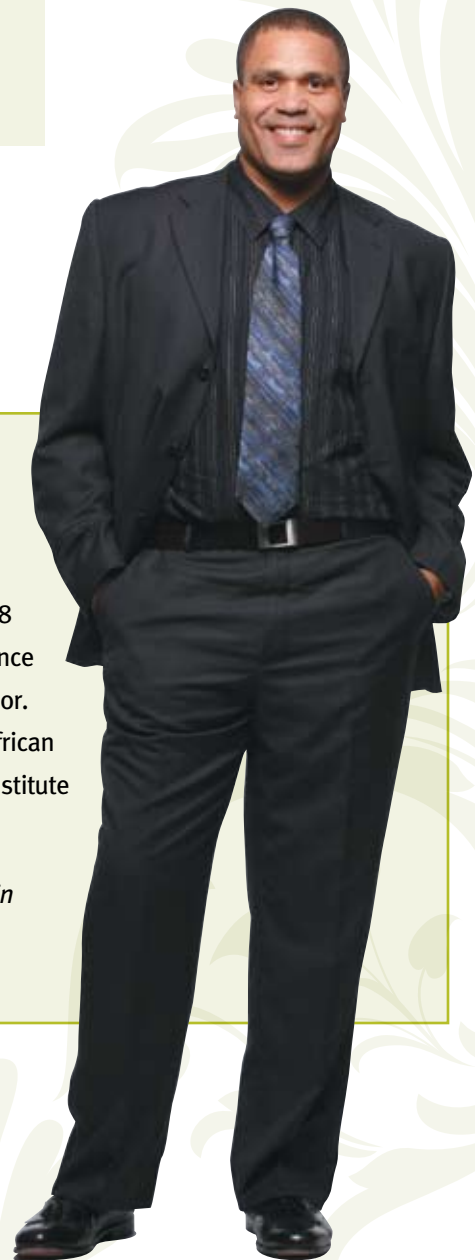

Social Justice is one of the university's pinnacle programs. The Centre for Studies in Social Justice, as a part of this pinnacle, serves as a forum to provide information and research exchanges related to a wide range of social justice issues – health, sexuality, racism, literacy, poverty, and gender inequalities, as well as the legal, environmental, and cultural challenges of restructuring, the global economy, and international development.

The Social Justice program is multi-disciplinary, allowing students to gain insight into the unique and complex challenges facing societies throughout the world. In a world increasingly characterized by conflict, on a global and national level, there is an urgent need for individuals who can bring clarity of thought and depth of understanding to bear upon our most pressing social, economic, and political problems. In this program, you will explore the roots of inequalities and evaluate different strategies to bring about social change. Social Justice is a combined honours program (to be taken with another subject) in the Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences at the University of Windsor.

Hub of Social Justice

The Centre for Studies in Social Justice provides a place for researchers from the University of Windsor and other universities, centres and institutes, policy makers and community members to address the causes and impact of widespread social and economic changes; research the elements that promote or impede social justice; access resources, training, and knowledge; stimulate discussion and debate on social justice issues; and to formulate recommendations on policies or strategies that could diminish existing injustices.

Psychology

Why do people behave the way they do? Our psychology program provides a broad base of knowledge concerning human behaviour. Courses cover many topics, including memory, motivation and decision-making, when, how and why people are influenced by the attitudes and actions of others, the origins and treatment of mental illness, human development from birth to death, and the role of culture in shaping the way we think and behave.

Our facilities include a variety of research laboratories within the department. We have established several working units that reflect the applied/service components of the graduate program, including the Clinical Neuropsychology Research and Resource Centre and the Child Study Centre. Students have the opportunity to participate in ongoing research projects and are encouraged to apply their classroom skills by getting involved in community organizations.

Developmental Psychology

Developmental Psychology is a specialized major within Psychology that focuses on child, adolescent, and adult development. Courses emphasize different developmental periods and various aspects of both normal and abnormal development. This program is ideal for students interested in pursuing higher educational degrees.

Behaviour, Cognition, and Neuroscience

Behaviour, Cognition and Neuroscience (BCN.) combines the biological aspects of psychology and biology relating to the brain and behaviour. This is an interdisciplinary program designed for students interested in carrying out research in the life/behavioural sciences as part of their undergraduate academic training.

Along with taking regular courses with students in the Faculty of Science and the Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences, students must also take directed research-based courses with one or more faculty. Students in this program will receive a Bachelor of Science degree upon graduation.

If you are looking for a professional career that makes a real difference in people’s lives, you should consider social work. Social work is a profession for those with a strong desire to help improve people’s lives. Social workers help people function the best way they can in their environment, deal with their relationships, and solve personal and family problems. Social workers often see clients who face a life-threatening disease or a social problem, such as inadequate housing, unemployment, a disability, or substance abuse. Social workers also assist families who have serious domestic conflicts, sometimes involving child or partner abuse. Social Work is a challenging career choice that offers scope for initiative and exercise of responsibility in a wide variety of practice situations.

At the University of Windsor’s School of Social Work, you will be able to choose from four different Bachelor of Social Work (BSW) program tracks; six Master of Social Work (MSW) program tracks; and one Doctoral track in Social Work (PhD). Both the BSW and Masters of Social Work (MSW) program tracks are fully accredited by the Canadian Association for Social Work Education (CASWE) and all graduates are eligible for membership in the Ontario Association of Social Workers (OASW) and registration with the Ontario College of Social Workers and Social

Service Workers (OCSWSSW). As well, Social Work is a preferred profession under the North America Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA), which allows graduates to work in the United States of America and Mexico.

Economics is a fascinating area whose ideas appear in different disguises in many subjects and many professions. Microeconomics focuses on the consumption and production of goods and services as well as the allocation of these goods between competing users. Macroeconomics focuses on issues related to inflation, unemployment, interest rates, exchange rates, economic growth and distribution on a national or international scale. Econometrics focuses on the means of manipulating data to infer reliable conclusions. These basic ideas are necessary to study specific issues and are extended in more advanced classes.

The B.A. in Economics is available as both a General and Honours degree. The Bachelor of Science in Economics is for students who wish to pursue graduate studies or intend to work as economists in both private and public sectors. Students also have the opportunity to study Economics through joint programs such as International Relations and Development Studies or pursuing a double major with another subject. Minors in Economics are available as well.

Women's Studies

Intellectually stimulating, personally fulfilling, and more practical than you might think.

The breadth and depth of Women's Studies will amaze you. Every course draws on multiple fields of knowledge. History, psychology, literature, economics, religion, sociology, and law all have a place in the curriculum. Courses develop your ability to critically assess what you see and read, and draw conclusions from what you discover. A deep understanding of women and gender is at the heart of the program, but this is not its boundary. Women's Studies courses are concerned with equality, fairness, and social justice in the broadest sense. Students examine how race, social class, religion, sexual preference, and gender shape society and culture.

Windsor offers a three-year General and a four-year Honours Bachelor of Arts degree. Students enrolled in the four-year program may major in Women's Studies alone or in conjunction with another discipline. Joint degrees with Psychology, English, History, Sociology, and Criminology are popular, as is the Combined Honours Bachelor of Social Work in Social Work and Women's Studies. The Distinguished Visitor in Women's Studies program offers students a unique opportunity to meet Canadian women whose activism on behalf of girls and women is nationally recognized. For one week each fall, our Visitor attends Women's Studies classes, offers seminars and workshops for the Windsor community, and delivers the keynote address at the Women's Studies Community Dinner.

Unique Programs

Double your Focus

An Honours program with a “Double Major” allows you to combine two major areas of study. The areas can be closely related like English and Dramatic Art, or seemingly diverse, like Philosophy and Computer Science, or Modern Languages (like German, Spanish or Italian) and Political Science. Pursue interests you already have and develop the tools you need for your chosen field of employment. Obtain specialized knowledge and skills in more than one area of interest, and tailor a program to your strengths. Combining two areas often leads to a deeper understanding, as you investigate similar ideas or facts from different perspectives. Almost any major (program) in Arts, Social Sciences, and Science can be combined with any other program in these areas in a double major.

Concurrent Honours Bachelor of Social Work and Honours Bachelor of Music Therapy

This double Honours degree provides students with the opportunity to pursue interdisciplinary studies in two complimentary professional areas. Building on a foundation of course work, supervised field practice (700 hours), and internship (1,000 hours), it prepares them for registered social work practice in Ontario (Ontario College of Social Workers and Social Service Workers) and elsewhere, as well as accredited/

certified music therapy practice in Canada and the United States. A background in both Music Therapy and Social Work is a unique and related practice foundation for work in a broad range of clinical and therapeutic settings.

Concurrent Education

Is there no doubt in your mind that you want to become a teacher? The University of Windsor is home to the Concurrent program, combining a Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Education, and Early Childhood Education diploma. Concurrent BA/BEd/ECE students receive a Bachelor of Arts and a Bachelor of Education (Primary-Junior) from the University of Windsor as well as a diploma in Early Childhood Education from St. Clair College. Students benefit significantly by being admitted directly into both the Faculty of Education and the Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences.

Disability Studies

The increased focus on the provision of services and the removal of barriers for people with disabilities means that graduates of this program will be in great demand as front-line workers by health, educational and social service agencies. They will possess the knowledge and skills necessary to understand and work with persons with disabilities. Graduates of this program who wish to continue their academic education will be competitive candidates for advanced certificates

and graduate programs in Autism, Applied Behavioural Analysis, Education, Psychology and Social Work and in the emerging fields of Social Justice, and most particularly, Disability Studies.

Liberal and Professional Studies

The Liberal and Professional Studies Program is a multi-disciplinary, general degree program for students who desire a university education combining a solid, academic core along with the opportunity to integrate combinations of discipline-based courses not possible in other programs. This program embodies the character of a traditional liberal arts education set in a contemporary academic and social context. By enrolling into the Liberal and Professionals Studies program, you enhance your job opportunities in a wide array of professional and technical fields.

Inter-faculty Programs

The following are not programs in the Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences. They do, however, rely heavily on Social Science and Arts courses.

Honours Bachelor of Arts and Science (BAS)

The Bachelor of Arts and Science program provides substantial education in the disciplines of both arts and sciences, and it puts an emphasis on critical thinking and argument. Throughout, students will take courses designed to foster the skills of inquiry and, in the third and fourth years, they will take courses in the methods of inquiry and applied inquiry. In addition to developing students' research skills and involving them with topics of public concern, these courses develop their abilities and confidence as writers and speakers.

Over the course of the program you will increase your understanding of the purposes and methods of the humanities and social and natural sciences and develop an integrated and holistic approach to the pursuit of wisdom and knowledge.

You will increase your skills in written and oral communication, in critical and imaginative thinking, and quantitative reasoning. You will also gain valuable experience in research into issues of personal and public concern.

Moreover, you will have close contact with professors actively engaged in exciting research either on scientific

questions or issues in politics, history, economics, philosophy, etc.

Finally, you will find yourself a member of a small select number of students on campus who are especially dedicated to getting as much out of their university years as they can.

Honours Bachelor of Environmental Studies (BES)

This program is truly interdisciplinary in approach and will introduce students to the social, cultural, economic, political, legal, and ethical factors affecting human interaction with the environment while at the same time ensuring they acquire a basic literacy in the physical and biological sciences. Graduates will understand the human dimensions of environmental issues and will be knowledgeable, skilled individuals capable of analyzing complex human-environmental situations and formulating effective political and social strategies to address human impact.

Honours Bachelor of Forensic Science (BFS)

Forensic Science is the study of evidence in modern criminal investigation for presentation in courts of law. The Honours Bachelor of Forensic Science Program will provide students with an

education in both the Social Sciences and the Sciences, with a focus on acquiring the skills and knowledge essential to the practice of professional Forensic Science. The program will enable students to develop as inquisitive researchers, have an understanding of scientific processes and protocols, lab procedures, criminality, judicial systems, (physical) evidence, the significance of high ethical standards, sophisticated interpersonal skills, and effective report writing and public speaking skills.

BA (Honours) in Forensics and Criminology

The Honours Bachelor of Arts degree in Forensics and Criminology is a unique inter-faculty program that combines courses from the sciences and social sciences. The program provides training in the identification, collection and presentation of evidence in criminal investigations, as well as an education in criminology including criminal justice, penology, policing, victimology, security, youth justice, and deviance. Final admission is competitive and will take place at the beginning of the third year.

Anthropology, Dr. John Albanese

Dr. Albanese conducts ongoing research in the fields of human skeletal biology, the history of physical anthropology, and forensic anthropology. He currently is developing and applying new approaches for investigating human variations using identified skeletal collections in North America and Europe including the Grant Human Skeletal Collection.

Communication Studies, Min Bae

Min Bae incorporates his research and filmmaking practices into classroom pedagogy emphasizing imagination and creativity over large, production intensive projects. His research interests and teaching areas are technical digital video and multi-media production. A collaborator on several award-winning independent films, his own films have been presented in festivals worldwide, including “Situation,” “Off Sync” and “Where are we.” His most recently completed film is “Made in China.”

Labour Studies, Dr. Alan Hall

Dr. Hall’s major areas of teaching are the sociology of law and work, and corporate crime. He is one of few sociologists in Canada concentrating on agri-environmental practices and policies in Canada with an emphasis on understanding the development of sustainable agriculture and organic farming. Dr. Hall is also

conducting ongoing research about recent developments in the policing of labour strikes and protest and occupational health and safety within auto parts plants in the Windsor area.

Political Science, Michael Bell

Former Canadian Ambassador to Israel, Jordan, and the Palestinian Authority, Michael Bell, is the Paul Martin Senior Scholar in International Diplomacy 2005-07, a joint appointment with the Faculty of Law and the Department of Political Science. He is teaching courses on the “Law and Politics of the Middle East.” He received a Bachelor degree in Economics in 1966 and his Master’s degree in Political Science in 1967. Bell was awarded the 2004 Alumni Award of Merit, has been named Fellow at the Weatherhead Centre for International Affairs at Harvard University, and was the Senior Scholar on diplomacy at the University of Toronto’s Munk Centre for International Studies.

Psychology, Dr. Jill Singleton-Jackson

Dr. Jackson was nominated for the University of Windsor Student Association (UWSA) Teacher of the Year Award for the 2003-2004 academic year. Her teaching interests include on-line instruction of writing, psychology, and first year classes for the Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences.

Dr. Jackson's unique teaching philosophy is to not only share information and content, but to give students the tools and the desire to be lifelong learners. Teaching is not about training; teaching is about changing lives and society.

Social Work, Dr. Brent Angell

Dr. Angell's research interests focus on social justice and anti-oppressive practice with a particular emphasis on First Nations. He is also renowned for his direct practice research and publications, which concentrate on critical perspectives on therapy and cross-cultural practice.

Sociology, Dr. Suzan Ilcan

Dr. Ilcan is Professor of Sociology and Canada Research Chair in Social Justice and Globalization Studies. Her five-year research programme on agencies of globalization deals with issues of globalization and social justice, governance and expertise, and development and poverty studies. Her most recent project is on the global governance of poverty, examining the relations among aid recipients, international and non-government organizations, and citizenship responsibility schemes. She teaches in the areas of development, culture and globalization, feminist theory, and qualitative methodology.

Women's Studies, Dr. Anne Forrest

Director of Women's Studies since 1996, Dr. Forrest is a founding member of Friends of Women's Studies, a community group that organizes and fundraises for the Distinguished Visitor in Women's Studies program. Her areas of teaching and research are industrial relations, women and work, and women and unions. Her scholarly publications examine issues pertinent to the study of industrial relations from a feminist perspective and have included papers on sexual harassment, unpaid work, and union activity of women workers.

Experiential Learning

Experiential education is an excellent opportunity for you to obtain career-related experience before you graduate. Many Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences programs provide these opportunities in the form of an internship or practicum. You will also obtain a course credit for participating. The following is a list of programs that offer this essential requirement to complement your degree.

Anthropology

This program offers students the opportunity to apply their academic knowledge within community organization settings. Students will be given the opportunity to learn about the day-to-day operation and structure of a social justice agency through observation of – and discussion with – staff and executive members. Students will be assigned a major project to carry out for the agency under the supervision of the course instructor and an on-site practicum supervisor.

Communication Studies

The Communication Studies Program offers opportunities in practicum or internship courses for students who would like to obtain on-the-job skills in their area of specialization. We place people locally, in Detroit, and in Toronto. They work at radio stations, TV/video operations, film productions, PR offices of non-profits, etc.

Labour Studies

Students will be able to apply their academic studies within labour organizations or in other community organizations. They will learn about the operation and structure of selected organizations by observing the daily

activities and by talking with staff, executive members, activists, and with the community members with whom the organization interacts.

Political Science

Public Management Internship Program provides the opportunity to receive career-related, supervised work experience in a public service management environment. The internship works in collaboration with the in-class component of the internship. This course gives a critical examination of selected theories and concepts applicable to research and management practices in the public sector.

Psychology

Supervised practicum in a university or community setting. Students will consolidate and enhance their knowledge about psychology and skills in connection with a specific project, activity, or task. The practicum experience may include the opportunity to be involved in some aspect of community change, peer counselling, or research, among other possibilities.

Developmental Psychology

Supervised practicum in learning-based behaviour change strategies. Students will practise behavioural assessment

and systematic remediation of clinical problems through application of operant techniques in community placements.

Social Justice

The practicum in Social Justice offers an opportunity to apply academic knowledge in a practical setting. Students will be placed in organizations dedicated to the pursuit of social justice in the Windsor area and assigned a major project to be completed in consultation with the course instructor and under the supervision of a field supervisor.

Social Work

The successful completion of eight Field Practice courses is required for graduation. All students will be assigned a field placement in a human service organization or community setting normally for two days per week in both the Fall and Winter semesters. Students must spend a minimum of 700 hours in field placement. The Field Program provides experiential educational opportunities directed toward the development of values, knowledge, and skills required for generalist practice in social work.

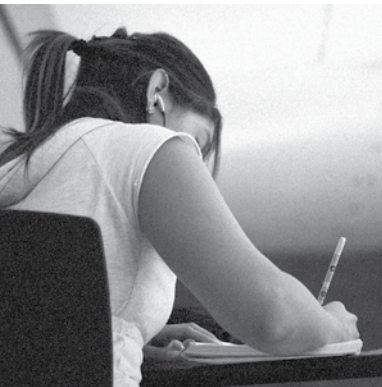
